
We served thousands of people even as we dealt with supplychain interruptions and health risks for our volunteers and staff.

## El Pasoans Fighting Hunger Food Bank Receives Approval to Increase CSFP Caseload

The food bank is thrilled to be awarded an increased caseload for CSFP boxes by the Texas Department of Agriculture. These boxes are made up of shelf-stable nutritious food, like dairy, fruits and vegetables, and grains, and also include nutrition education information. The approval of the temporary caseload will allow the food bank to enroll more seniors in the program, up to 1,000 more.

The CSFP works to improve the health of low-income persons at least 60 years of age by supplementing their diets with nutritious USDA Foods. The program is a monthly commitment for clients who must pick up their CSFP box at least once a month at the food bank. This does not affect their eligibility to visit the food bank or any other distribution site. However, clients must commit to picking up their box monthly in order to continue the program.

"We are seeing people becoming very interested in this program," stated Karmela Galica, Director of Programs at El Pasoans Fighting Hunger Food Bank. "The community has learned about this important program and we are able to meet that increased interest with the expanded caseload. Additionally, clients enrolled in CSFP can have access to the FOOD FARMacy."

CSFP is available only to adults 60+ who meet the eligibility criteria. During the intake process, those who qualify for the program are quickly identified through the Link2Feed system and offered the opportunity to participate. Those wishing to participate present an ID, fill out the application, and pick up their CSFP box each month.

## **FEMA Funds Aid Recovery**

**Excellent News!** FEMA awarded El Pasoans Fighting Hunger Food Bank additional funds to purchase one month of food! This was welcome news after the food bank was hit hard during the winter storms and the increased demand some agencies saw for food due to COVID-19.

The funding from FEMA in 2020 and now in 2021 had a huge impact on the food bank's ability to feed the community.

## **EPFH Using New Technology**

The new Link2Feed client database software has been fully rolled out at four of the five primary sites and the majority of the food bank's mobile pantries.

L2F allows clients to enroll, and, once they are determined to be eligible, to access food at any of our Link2Feed-enabled partners without enrolling again. Once enrolled, they will only be asked to update and verify information and won't have to re-enroll when going to a new EPFH L2F enabled site. This software also provides the food bank with valuable data that is used to determine where the need is greatest, and, strategically, where new distribution sites are needed to better serve the community.

## **Food FARMacy**

The Food FARMacy has opened on a limited basis as a large client choice pantry. Once the pandemic is behind us, the food bank will



convert to a full Food FARMacy, focusing on serving individuals with food-related illnesses and others with special dietary needs.

At this time the Food FARMacy is open to very low-income seniors who are part of the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP), which works to improve the health of low-income persons at least 60 years of age by supplementing their diets with nutritious USDA Foods. Food FARMacy participants love being able to shop for their own food, just like at a grocery store!

# Assistance to Refugees and Migrants Entering the U.S.

Each day, the food bank is making between 150 and 350 individually packaged breakfasts and lunches for the refugees staying at local shelters. In addition, the food bank is also providing ingredients for producing hot evening meals to local faith-based community agencies. The food bank is actively providing food, water, and hygiene products for the migrants to take on the bus journeys to their ultimate destinations. FEMA asked the food bank to provide the trucking, logistics, and warehousing for extra items (toys, snacks, etc.) for the unaccompanied minors being housed at Fort Bliss.
